Correctional Staff Health and Wellness (S7E5)	<u>Link</u>	This episode addresses mental and physical health for correctional staff and looks at the importance of sound workplace interventions that correctional systems may want to consider before attempting to implement health and wellness initiatives to assist carceral staff.
Substance Use Disorder in Prisons and Jails (S7E6)	<u>Link</u>	This episode covers three key topics: fentanyl, K2, and drug testing. These three issues challenge correctional staff; their level of understanding regarding fentanyl and K2, specifically, is generally very limited.
Medication for Substance Use Disorders in Prisons and Jails (S7E7)	Link	This episode discusses three articles that highlight what MOUD treatments are, how jails/prisons can partner with community providers to offer them, and barriers and facilitators to MAT/MOUD implementation.
Cultural Competency in Carceral Settings (S7E8)	<u>Link</u>	This episode explores cultural competency in correctional facilities, focusing on race/ethnicity and gender/sexual identity.
