Women & MOUD (S6E6)	<u>Link</u>	This episode takes an in-depth look at gender disparities and substance use disorder (SUD) treatment (typically medication for opioid use disorder (MOUD) and counseling).
Pregnant People & MOUD (S6E7)	Link	This episode considers medication for opioid use disorder treatment among individuals who are pregnant. The researchers report interesting findings related to pregnancy and race/ethnicity and suggest some reasons for disparities including stigma and Medicaid access.
Pregnant, Post-partum, & OUD (S6E8)	<u>Link</u>	This episode reports on the prevalence of OUD-related hospital use during the postpartum period.
People with Disabilities & SUD Treatment (S6E9)	<u>Link</u>	This episode discusses the needs of people with disabilities and SUD and the need for improved attention to the unique needs of people with disabilities who may need treatment for SUDs.
SUD & Structural Racism (S6E10)	<u>Link</u>	This addresses the history of racialized drug policy in the U.S., including the use the five components of the structural competency framework as a way to suggest avenues that may change our understanding treatment planning for individuals from historically minoritized groups.
Interview With Dr. Tisha Wiley (S8E1)	<u>Link</u>	Dr. Wiley discusses the Justice Community Opioid Innovation Network (JCOIN) and the Learning Experiences to Advance Practice (LEAP) program. She also explains the goals, foci, and next steps for JCOIN.
Sleep and Marijuana (S8E2)	<u>Link</u>	This episode looks at the relationship between sleep and marijuana use.
Addiction & Pregnancy Behind Bars (S8E3)	<u>Link</u>	In this episode, the struggle with addiction faced by pregnant incarcerated people is discussed.
Health Behind Bars (S8E5)	<u>Link</u>	This episode discusses incarcerated individuals' health, including how they obtain their sources of health information.
