The Justice Community **Opioid Innovation Network** (JCOIN) Coordination and Translation Center (CTC), led by Dr. Faye S. Taxman of George Mason University and Dr. Danielle S. Rudes of Sam Houston State University, is a cooperative of organizations that conducts research, engages stakeholders, disseminates findings, and provides support and infrastructure to JCOIN.

The CTC first developed the JCOIN Training & Engagement Center (JTEC) as part of the CTC website to provide pandemic-friendly learning resources for a variety of audiences.

As of Spring 2024, JTEC hosts over 60 courses, more than 30 recorded webinars, 8 quick lessons, and over 70 podcast episodes.



Barriers and Facilitators Within Opioid Intervention **Courts That Impact Substance Use Disorder Treatment**

Findings From JCOIN's New York State Psychiatric Institute (NYSPI)/Columbia **University Clinical Research Center**

To address the high rates of opioid use disorder (OUD) and overdose among individuals involved in the court system, New York developed the Opioid Intervention Court (OIC), a novel pre-plea court model that specifically addresses OUD by providing rapid screening and connections to community-based treatment within 24 hours of arrest.

OIC diverts participants at arraignment and temporarily pauses prosecution to allow the individuals to initiate treatment. The model was designed to reduce wait times and improve referral and linkages to evidence-based treatment services (e.g., medications for OUD [MOUD], cognitive behavioral therapy [CBT]), specialized peer support, intensive case management, and etc...

New Report Features 10 Best Practices for Jails and Prisons when Responding to Opioid **Use Disorder**

Study Identifies Key Indicators of Stigma Toward Individuals Who Use Methamphetamines

Findings From JCOIN's Methodology and **Advanced Analytics Resource Center** (MAARC)

A study recently published in Preventive Medicine Reports by researchers at the University of Chicago and NORC identified several factors associated with higher stigma towards individuals who use methamphetamines.

Six variables were significantly associated with higher stigma: older age, higher household income, married status...

7 Best Practices for Using **MOUD Across the Cascade of** Care in Criminal Legal Settings

Findings From JCOIN's Coordination and **Translation Center (CTC)**



The growing rates of substance use and overdose deaths have significantly

impacted the U.S. criminal legal system. Almost half of individuals in federal facilities (Mumola & Karberg, 2006), 58% in state facilities, and 63% in county jails (Bronson, 2017) have a substance use disorder. Despite the high prevalence rates), very few individuals receive evidence-based treatment, such as medications for opioid use disorder (MOUD). Providing MOUD during incarceration and during reentry has shown to reduce overdose deaths (Degenhardt et al., 2024) and recidivism (Evans et al., 2022), and increase treatment engagement, retention, and health outcomes (National Academies of Sciences, 2019).

New Study on Stigmatizing Imagery for Substance Use Disorders Released

Findings From Addiction Policy Forum (APF), a JCOIN CTC Partner Organization



A new Addiction Policy Forumled study explores stigmatizing and non-stigmatizing imagery

for substance use disorders (SUD) and criminal justice contact.



The qualitative study of people with lived experience with SUD identified stigmatizing images of substance use and criminal justice settings, along with alternative images to utilize. Researchers found that certain images were identified by individuals as not only stigmatizing but triggering, making individuals reactive and think of using again (i.e., relapse).

The results are published in the latest edition of the journal Health & Justice.

"Stigma is a major barrier to treatment and recovery for individuals with SUD, with intersecting stigma experiences for those who are also justice-involved," explained Jessica Hulsey, the study's lead author and the executive director of the Addiction Policy Forum. "Much of the imagery currently used to depict addiction in the news, social media, television and in publications can be both triggering and stigmatizing for those in recovery from SUD. We hope the findings can be helpful in informing the selection of less harmful imagery to represent substance use disorders."

She is recognized for her work examining how social control organizations and their middle management and street-level workers understand, negotiate, and at times, resist change.


